

Joan O'Hanlon Curry Chosen as the 2007 CPON® of the Year



The Oncology Nursing Certification Corporation (ONCC) has selected Joan O'Hanlon Curry, RN, MS, CPNP, CPON®, as the 2007 CPON® of the Year. Curry won the award for her significant contributions to pediatric oncology nursing and oncology nursing service and for supporting and promoting certification in oncology nursing. She is an administrative nurse manager and pediatric nurse practitioner at the Children's Hospital at Montefiore (CHAM) in the Bronx, NY. Curry was presented with her award at the ONCC Recognition Breakfast for Certified Pediatric Oncology Nurses on October 5, 2007, in Milwaukee, WI.

According to one of her colleagues, in just two years since joining CHAM, Curry has had "a major impact on the quality of care delivered, the research infrastructure, the administrative organization of the division (which has had far reaching impact on the hospital overall), the education of nurses and nurse practitioners, and establishing standards."

Curry is noted for her many accomplishments, including the development of an ambulatory chemotherapy program in which children receive chemotherapy as outpatients via pumps in backpacks, her service as an instructor and trainer for nursing courses, and the introduction of town hall meetings where patients and families can discuss issues related to treatment and services.

The CPON® of the Year Award is supported by Novartis Oncology and is presented annually to an oncology-certified nurse. To win the award, nominees must obtain recommendations from two colleagues in the pediatric oncology profession; prepare an essay describing how he or she has promoted certification; summarize services offered that enhance pediatric oncology care and oncology nursing; and demonstrate

accomplishments in one of three areas of pediatric oncology nursing practice: clinical practice, education, or research. Recipients are presented with \$1,000 and a crystal award at the Recognition Breakfast for Certified Pediatric Oncology Nurses at the Association of Pediatric Oncology Nurses Annual Conference.

ONS Member Wins Prestigious Award



At a gala reception in Toronto, Canada, Lesley Degner, RN, BN, MA, PhD, a professor in the Faculty of Nursing at the University of Manitoba, was formally recognized as one of

Canada's 10 leading cancer researchers. Degner, an ONS member and past ONS Distinguished Researcher, received the National Cancer Institute of Canada's (NCIC) Diamond Jubilee Award as part of its 60th anniversary celebration. NCIC created six one-time NCIC Diamond Jubilee Awards to recognize researchers of outstanding achievement who, within the last six decades, have conducted high-impact cancer research.

Degner is one of 12 chairs in the Canadian Health Services Research Foundation and the Canadian Institutes of Health Research in health services and nursing research in Canada. She heads the Development of Evidence-Based Nursing Practice in Cancer Care, Palliative Care, and Cancer Prevention program at the University of Manitoba. She is considered an expert in the psychosocial aspects of cancer care and symptom management.

Degner was awarded the NCIC Diamond Jubilee Award for her research into behaviors and supportive care leading to improved quality-of-life and supportive

tools for patients with cancer. She is a previous recipient of the Canadian Association of Nurses in Oncology Award of Excellence for Research.

Prostate Cancer Foundation Announces David H. Koch Nano-Medicine Gift

One of the largest-ever individual donations for prostate cancer research will unite researchers across institutions and disciplines in the field of nanotechnology. The research team, created by the Prostate Cancer Foundation (PCF), will seek to develop a novel nano-medicine that can be given via IV and delivered directly to targeted prostate tumors. The \$5 million gift by philanthropist and business leader David H. Koch was announced at the foundation’s Annual Scientific Retreat.

Although Koch has supported a wide range of medical research, prostate cancer is a topic of special interest—he is a survivor of the disease, along with his three brothers.

Koch explained why he chose PCF to be the recipient of his gift, “Nanotechnology has the potential to cure men with advanced prostate cancer without exposing them to severe side effects. The scientific team assembled for this work is the best in the business, and if it is possible for any group to be successful in the development of this therapy, it will be this one.”

Partner institutions in the collaboration include Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Weill Cornell Medical College, Brigham and Women’s Hospital at Harvard Medical School, and the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute. Researchers include Omid Farokhzad, MD, Neil Bander, MD, Philip Kantoff, MD, and Robert Langer, ScD.

Nanotechnology is the field of research that involves materials that are extremely small—the size of atoms or molecules. It holds promise for the detection, diagnosis, and treatment of cancer. The ultimate goal of the nano-medicine project is rapid bench-to-bedside translation of the research to patients with cancer.

Georgetown Names New Director of Lombardi Comprehensive Cancer Center

Georgetown University Medical Center (GUMC) and GU Hospital announced the appointment of Louis M. Weiner, MD, as director of the Lombardi Comprehensive Cancer Center. Weiner, who has a long and distinguished career in cancer research and patient care, is an internationally recognized medical oncologist, specializing in the treatment of gastrointestinal cancers. Weiner previously served as the chair of the Department of Medical Oncology at Fox Chase Cancer Center in Philadelphia, PA. He replaces Anatoly “Tony” Dritschilo, MD, who served as interim director of the cancer center since November 2005.

“The recruitment of Dr. Weiner marks the end of a nationwide search for a Lombardi director whose accomplishments and vision align with GUMC’s mission and goals of providing cutting-edge cancer research, education, and patient care,” said Howard Federoff, MD, PhD, executive vice president for health sciences at GUMC.

Weiner is board-certified in internal medicine and medical oncology by the American Board of Internal Medicine. He has published more than 150 scientific papers and lectures extensively on targeted therapies for cancer. Weiner is chair of the Immunology Task Force of the American Association for Cancer Research, serves on the steering committee of the National Cancer Institute Translational Research Working Group and is a standing member of the Cancer Immunopathology and Immunotherapy Study Section of the National Institutes of Health. Active in many other professional organizations, Weiner is on several journal editorial boards, including *Cancer Research* and *Clinical Cancer Research*, and also reviews manuscripts for numerous peer-reviewed medical journals.

Francis S. Collins Receives the Presidential Medal of Freedom

President George W. Bush awarded Francis S. Collins, MD, PhD, the Presidential Medal of Freedom at a ceremony held at the White House on November 5, 2007. The nation’s highest civil award, the Presidential Medal of Freedom was established by Executive Order 11085 in 1963. The medal may be awarded by the President “to any person who

has made an especially meritorious contribution to (1) the security or national interests of the United States, or (2) world peace, or (3) cultural or other significant public or private endeavors.”

Collins was recognized for revolutionizing genetic research. Under his leadership, the Human Genome Project mapped and sequenced the full human genome and greatly expanded knowledge of human DNA.
