Kagan Receives MacArthur Fellow "Genius" Award



Oncology Nursing Society (ONS) member Sarah H. Kagan, PhD, RN, has been awarded a MacArthur Fellowship, the socalled "genius" award. She is only the second nurse to receive the honor, which comes

with an award of support of \$500,000 over the next five years. Kagan is an associate professor of gerontological nursing and the Doris R. Schwartz Term Professor in Gerontological Nursing in the School of Nursing at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia.

The MacArthur Fellows Program, sponsored by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation, is designed to emphasize the importance of the creative individual in society. Fellows are selected for the originality and creativity of their work and the potential to do more in the future. Candidates are nominated, evaluated, and selected through a rigorous and confidential process. No one may apply for the awards, nor are any interviews conducted with nominees.

"The fellowship offers highly creative people the gift of time and the unfettered opportunity to explore, create, and accomplish," said MacArthur Foundation President Jonathan F. Fanton. "The new MacArthur Fellows illustrate the Foundation's conviction that talented individuals, free to follow their insights and instincts, will make a difference in shaping the future."

"I am mystified by the tremendous honor and the responsibility I believe comes attached with [the award]," said Kagan. "I hope it brings great visibility to nurses who dedicate their lives to working with older adults—both those who conduct research but especially those nurses who daily put their clinical expertise to work by caring for older adults with cancer."

As one of 24 fellows for 2003, Kagan was selected for revising, through clinical research, mentorship, and personal example, standards and practices for delivering health care to older adults suffering from cancer.

According to Afaf I. Meleis, PhD, FAAN, RN, dean of the School of Nursing at the University of Pennsylvania, Kagan "epitomizes the commitment of nurses who blend true scholarship with the highest humanitarian levels of nursing care to produce evidence-based practice, providing expert care

to vulnerable patients. It is a very special day for nursing as well because this award highlights the significance of what nursing is for patients and for health care."

Kagan is the author of Older Adults Coping With Cancer: Integrating Cancer Into a Life Mostly Lived (1997) and was a column editor for the American Journal of Nursing. In addition to ONS, where she is an active member of the Advanced Nursing Research Special Interest Group, Kagan holds memberships in the Gerontological Society of America and the Society of Head and Neck Nurses.

Frank-Stromborg Appointed to National Advisory Council for Nursing Research

ing Research. Frank-Stromborg holds a threeyear term on the council, which is part of the National Institutes of Health (NIH). The council's 15 members, 7 of whom are professional nurses recognized as experts in clinical practice, education, or research, advise leaders of the HHS, NIH, and National Institute of Nursing Research. Matters of concern include the conduct, support, and dissemination of information including basic and clinical nursing research, training, and other programs in health care. Council members also make recommendations on applications for research and research training grants and recommend those applications for projects that show promise of making valuable contributions to human knowledge.

Frank-Stromborg has received numerous awards, including the ONS Excellence of Scholarship and Consistency of Contributions to the Oncology Nursing Literature Award, supported by SuperGen, Inc., and the ONS Award for Excellence in Cancer Nursing Education, supported by Ross Products, a Division of Abbott Laboratories. She also was a recipient of the ONS Foundation Mara Mogensen Flaherty Memorial Lectureship in 1986.

An active ONS member, Frank-Stromborg has served in many different roles, including

serving on the ONS Board of Directors and as chair of the Oncology Nursing Certification Corporation's Research Committee. Her contributions include 7 books, 34 book chapters, and more than 83 journal articles to the nursing and medical literature. She also edited Cancer Prevention in Diverse Populations (2nd ed.), along with ONS member Sharon Olsen, MS, AOCN®, published by ONS. Frank-Stromborg received her EdD in educational psychology from Northern Illinois University (NIU), her master of science degree in nursing from the Graduate School of Nursing at New York Medical College, and her bachelor of science degree in biology and chemistry from NIU. She also holds a law degree from the NIU College of Law as a licensed adult nurse practitioner.

An NIU distinguished research professor, Frank-Stromborg also serves on the State of Illinois Board of Nursing as well as the National Cancer Institute Scientific Review Group—Subcommittee H, which reviews all cooperative oncology groups. She also chairs the research committee for the American Board of Nursing Specialties.

"My first impression of Debbie put me immediately at ease. She was professional yet down to earth; she was compassionate and caring," said Don Dilg, a Spanish teacher, varsity golf coach, and director of special events at Bishop Fenwick High School in Middletown, OH. "Debbie is a highly trained medical professional, yet she was able to teach me how to manage my illness. From her I learned the key to limiting my cancer; I learned that cancer cannot conquer the spirit, it cannot shatter hope, it cannot cripple love, and it cannot silence courage. Through her example, Debbie has given me a new life, one filled with peace, a positive attitude, and a lot of hope."

Soldano's responsibilities include research, patient education, management of pre- and postoperative issues, and supervision of the daily operations of the Division of Surgical Oncology. Soldano is pursuing her master's degree at UC to become a nurse practitioner.

American Cancer Society Gives "Trish Greene Quality of Life Award" to Article on Cancer Pain Control

The American Cancer Society (ACS) recently bestowed its annual award for the best quality-of-life manuscript to "Implementing Cancer Pain Education for Medical Students." The article was published in the September/October 2001 issue of *Cancer Practice*, which has ceased publication.

This article describes a study to develop and pilot test a cancer pain education course for medical students consisting of a one-hour structured home hospice visit. The authors concluded that the use of actual patients with cancer, rather than simple didactic lectures, improved the educational value of the program. The authors of the study from the University of Kentucky, College of Medicine, Lexington, are Paul A. Sloan, MD, associate professor, Department of Anesthesiology; Margaret Plymale, RN, Department of Surgery; Mitzi Johnson, PhD, associate professor, Department of Behavioral Science; and Christopher Montgomery, MD, associate professor, Department of Anesthesiology. The authors from the Hospice of the Bluegrass, also in Lexington, are ONS members Pat LaFountain, RN, and Janet Snapp, RN, MSN, OCN®.

The Trish Greene Quality of Life Award honors the life and work of the late Patricia (Trish) Greene, RN, PhD. Greene, who was an active ONS member, served in a variety of roles as a volunteer and professional staff member during her 20-year association with ACS. Before her untimely death in August 1999, Greene received numerous awards for her lifelong contributions to improving and expanding patient and family services, establishing pain management as a foundation of cancer care, securing scholarships for oncology nurses and social workers, and recognizing and fostering the excellence of care being provided by all disciplines throughout the country.
